Preserving privacy during washing and dressing

• Environment suitable and well prepared

- All the resources and equipment needed are to hand.
- The environment has been prepared (e.g. privacy, temperature, hygiene, privacy notice on door).

• Personalised support

- The CYP's protocols, procedures, preferred routines and related learning targets are known.
- Staff know how to make the CYP as comfortable as possible throughout.
- CYP changed into own clothing, which is comfortable in all positions (e.g. sitting, standing, lying) and appropriate to CYP body shape, easy to take on and off; appropriate to the CYP's preferences.
- Following changing, the CYP is left comfortable and engaged in their next activity.

• Communication

- The CYP has had accessible information about what is happening, understands it and has had time to take it in.
- Any communication support needed during the process is available and to hand.
- CYP is at the centre of respectful and empowering interaction with staff throughout (e.g. meaningfully included, not talked over).

• Safeguarding, privacy and dignity

- Other staff have been discretely informed of what is happening.
- If needed, a helper is available to support lifting and handling.
- Maximum possible privacy for the CYP is ensured (e.g. privacy notice on door).
- Strategies are in place so the CYP is exposed as little as possible (e.g. covering with a dry, clean towel for modesty when possible).
- Interruptions kept to a minimum; if unavoidable, knocking for permission to enter.

• Participation

- CYP is encouraged to increase independence in line with protocols and learning targets.
- The environment is tidied afterwards involving the CYP if appropriate.
